## A 'BIG' Agenda for 2021

Cessnock City Council's General Manager, Lotta Jackson is optimistic about 2021 with some big goals to be achieved as Council is well into delivering the 2020-2021 Operational Plan. The highlight is the more than \$30 million Capital Works Program which is made possible by Council's continued sound financial decision making and success in applying for grant funding.

Ms Jackson said Council will continue its commitment to financial sustainability.

"I'm proud of last year's annual report. Despite COVID-19 and the challenges that arose, we delivered and came out with a modest deficit of \$203,000. A pleasing result considering the adverse experience of other councils across NSW. We look forward to finalising a number of projects, such as Gingers Lane and the installation of the roundabout at the intersection, and commencing work on other significant projects including the \$8.8 million Cessnock Airport upgrade and the \$4.7 million upgrade of the Kurri Kurri CBD."

### NEW ERA FOR THE ARTS AND CREATIVE INDUSTRIES

2021 is a big year for the arts in the Cessnock Local Government Area. We're at the concept stage of a redesign of the Cessnock Performing Arts Centre (CPAC) to develop a working 'cultural hub'.

The project valued at \$2 million is an investment in the arts and it's anticipated it will allow for exhibition style events, intimate contemporary performances and a workshop area that will host a diverse range of activities. Curator of Performing and Creative Arts Vicki Sienczuk said "the cultural hub will provide the community with an exciting facility able to deliver high quality, energetic and accessible art, performances and cultural programming for the enjoyment of residents and visitors."

We look forward to keeping you in the loop as we progress the creation of this unique community space for the arts.

## YOU SUPPORTED LOCAL!

We wanted to thank every resident and visitor to the Cessnock Local Government Area that made an effort to shop locally during the last six months. Your support has made a difference! Data from October 2020 indicates that businesses in Cessnock are experiencing about a 30% increase in spending compared to October 2019. It's a ripple effect with data for Kurri Kurri, Greta and Branxton also showing increased spending. This followed our Support Local Campaign which was launched last year as we suffered a downturn in visitors to the region due to bush fires and COVID-19. The campaign, a collaboration between our Economic Development Team and local business chambers, continued into Christmas. It is a success with our locals backing each other and shopping local!

Things for 2021 are shaping up well for our business community and this has been echoed by new cafe owners Phil and Luke Collins from Quick Bites.



"Since our doors opened we have continued to see an increase in customers week after week. We've also decided to keep our doors open longer to meet the needs of customers who may be after an afternoon caffeine hit or bite to eat," said Phil.
